



To participate, simply place your bet in the corresponding box.

If the first card in your box forms a pair with the bank's first card, you qualify for the Crazy Twins

Bets placed in the Crazy Twins Bonus area win if you are qualified and your final Black Jack's hand beats the final bank's hand.

All pairs, regardless of suit and/or value, pay 20 times the bet.

Only a pair of matching 5s (same suit and same value) pays 300 times the bet.

In case of a Tie with the bank's hand, you will win 50% of the payout.

If you decided to split your Black Jack hand, you will win 50% immediately of the payout. The bonus Crazy Twins ends as soon as a split is made.

SHORT HISTORY OF THE BLACK JACK

One of the earliest predecessors of Black Jack was a French card game called "Vingt-et-Un".

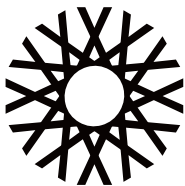
At "Vingt-et-Un", players had to reach a hand value of 21 points without exceeding it.

In the 18th and 19th centuries, French colonists brought "Vingt-et-Un" to North America, where it gained popularity.

In the early 20th century, casinos in the United States offered a special bonus payout to players who were dealt an Ace of Spades and a Black Jack (Jack of Clubs or Jack of Spades) in their initial hand. This bonus payout was referred to as "Black Jack," and the name stuck, becoming synonymous with the game.

During the mid-20th century, Black Jack's popularity surged. Casinos standardized the rules.

Throughout the years, Black Jack continued to evolve, with various rule variations and side bets being introduced. The Black Jack is one of the most popular and enduring casino games worldwide.

HOW TO PLAY

The goal is to draw cards totalling “21”, or as close as possible without going over “21”.

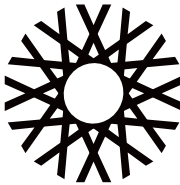
You play against the dealer.

The game begins with each player making a wager in the area designated on the table. Bets are placed, then the dealer draws the cards face up - one to each player and one to himself - followed by a second card to each player.

Cards are counted at their face value. All face cards count as 10. Aces count as either 1 or 11.

If you have a "Black Jack" (an ace with a picture, or ten with your first two cards) it beats any other combination except a dealer's Black Jack and you win 3/2 for your bet. If the dealer also has a Black Jack it is a stand-off.

If you do not have Black Jack you decide from your hand to take more cards (draw) or stand. You may take as many cards as you wish until you think you have a score closer to 21 than the dealer will have. Once you have a score of 21 you may not draw any additional cards. The dealer must draw on 16 or under and must stand on 17 or over. The first Ace in a hand counts as 11, unless this would cause the total to exceed 21. Subsequent Aces count as 1.



PAYOUTS

If you have a Black Jack, you win 3:2 on your initial bet, unless the dealer also has a Black Jack.

If you tie with the dealer, it is a ‘stand-off’.

If your total is closer to 21 than the dealer's, you win even money.

If your total is lower than the dealer's, you lose.

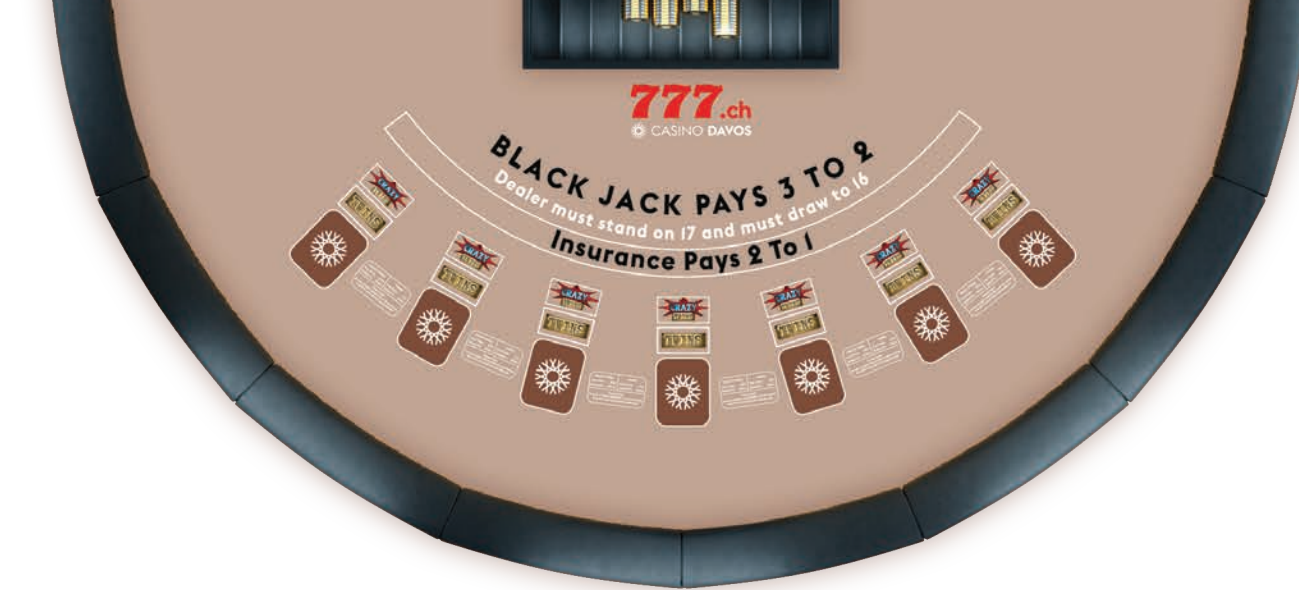
If you go over 21 you lose.

SPLIT

When you have two cards of the same value, you can split the pair into two separate hands and play each hand individually, up to a maximum of two hands. You must bet the same amount as your initial bet on each split hand. If you split aces, you receive only one card for each ace.

DOUBLE DOWN

Consider this if you think you can win with only one additional card. You may wager additional money up to your original bet and receive one more card. A player has the option of doubling down after a hand has been split. Split Aces cannot be double-down.



INSURANCE

If the dealer's “up card” is an Ace, you can take insurance. Here, you're betting that the dealer has a Black Jack.

You can bet up to half your original bet. If the dealer does have a Black Jack and you don't have a Black Jack, your original bet loses and the insurance is paid two to one. If the dealer doesn't have a Black Jack, he takes the insurance bet and the game continues.

ADDITIONAL BETS

“Twins” and “Crazy Twins” are a side bet based on the first player's card and the first dealer's card being a pair. You can play independently on Bonus “Twins” and “Crazy Twins”. You can also place both bets on the same hand. The bet can only be placed if you have played on the initial Black Jack betting area.

All pairs, regardless of suit and/or value, pay 10 times the bet.



Only a pair of matching 5s (same suit and same value) pays 100 times the bet.
